
THE NATURE OF FRAGILE THINGS by Susan Meissner


EXILES by Christine Baker Kline

THE WORST HARD TIME by Timothy Egan

The dust storms that terrorized the High Plains in the darkest years of the Depression were like nothing ever seen before or since. Egan rescues this iconic chapter of American history from the shadows in a tour de force of historical reportage. Following a dozen families and their communities through the rise and fall of the region, Egan tells of their desperate attempts to carry on through blinding black dust blizzards, crop failure, and the death of loved ones.

American Pain chronicles the rise and fall of this game-changing pill mill, and how it helped tip the nation into its current opioid crisis.

THE LIBRARY BOOK by Susan Orlean


On the morning of April 29, 1986, a fire alarm sounded in the Los Angeles Public Library. As the moments passed, the patrons and staff who had been cleared out of the building realized this was not the usual fire alarm. The fire was disastrous: it reached 2000 degrees and burned for more than seven hours. By the time it was extinguished, it had consumed four hundred thousand books and damaged seven hundred thousand more. Investigators descended on the scene, but more than thirty years later, the mystery remains: Did someone purposefully set fire to the library—and if so, who?

KILLERS OF THE FLOWER MOON by David Grann

In the 1920s, the richest people per capita in the world were members of the Osage Indian nation in Oklahoma. After oil was discovered beneath their land, they rode in chauffeured automobiles, built mansions, and sent their children to study in Europe. Then, one by one, the Osage began to be killed off. The family of an Osage woman, Mollie Burkhart, became a prime target. Her relatives were shot and poisoned. And it was just the beginning, as more and more members of the tribe began to die under mysterious circumstances.

CDBG SENIOR PROGRAMS

Each year the City of Lighthouse Point applies for CDBG funding for Library Senior Programs.

The receipt of this funding is NOT guaranteed from year to year. Per grant guidelines,

CDBG programs are ONLY open to Lighthouse Point residents who are ages 62 and over.

The CDBG grant and senior programs are coordinated by Library staff.

WHAT DOES CDBG FUND?

CDBG funding covers a portion of participants' supplies (such as books, yoga mats, or watercolor paints/brushes), select in-Library equipment (such as iPads or printers), the use/cleaning of facilities, and the staff time required to teach and coordinate each CDBG class session.

HOW DO I ENROLL IN THE CDBG PROGRAM?

Enrollment in the CDBG program must be done in-person at the Library.

Proof of City residency, age, and a signed FY22/23 CDBG enrollment form are required.

CDBG enrollment is valid from October 01, 2022 to September 30, 2023.

HOW DO I GET A SPOT IN A CDBG CLASS?

There are multiple announcements for the CDBG registration lottery each season.

Past announcements have included the City newsletter, Library website,
banners at intersections, bulk emailing, and posters in the Library.

While the lottery is open, residents who are fully enrolled in the CDBG program may select which classes they would like to attend. They rate their selections by assigning each class a number (1=First choice, 2=Second choice etc.).

When the lottery closes, residents are selected at random for space in each class.

Every effort is made for lottery participants to get in to at least one CDBG class per season.

IS THERE A WAITLIST FOR CLASSES THAT ARE FULL?

Yes. When a class becomes full, a waitlist is started. If a spot opens, participants are pulled from the waitlist by lottery. Per grant guidelines, priority is given to waitlist participants who have NOT attended ANY CDBG course since October 01, 2022 (unserved residents).

WHAT HAPPENS IF I NEED TO MISS A CLASS?


It is each participant's responsibility to let the Library know if they require an extended absence. Participants who miss TWO sessions in a row, without any notification to Library staff will lose their spot in the class.

CDBG ZOOM BOOK CLUB

IN-PERSON REGISTRATION REQUIRED. THIS IS AN ONLINE CLASS THROUGH ZOOM

CDBG programs are only open to Lighthouse Point residents ages 62 and over. Proof of City residency, age, and a signed enrollment form in the CDBG program are required. Registration and enrollment in a CDBG program must be done in-person at the Library. All CDBG paperwork and waivers must be on file to register and/or enter the registration lottery. Participants who attend a course will receive FREE grant-funded supplies. Participation in the program is a requirement of CDBG funding. Individuals who enroll in the program but do not attend TWO sessions in a row will lose their space in the program.


4:00pm | Wednesday | January 18, 2023 MIRACLE CREEK by Angle Kim

Debut Novel. In 2008 in a small town in Virginia, a group of people know each other because they're part of a special treatment center, a hyperbaric chamber that may cure a range of conditions from infertility to autism. But then the chamber explodes, two people die, and it's clear the explosion wasn't an accident. A powerful showdown unfolds as the story moves across characters who are all maybe keeping secrets, hiding betrayals. Chapter by chapter, we shift alliances and gather evidence: Was it the careless mother of a patient? Was it the owners, hoping to cash in on a big insurance payment and send their daughter to college? Could it have been a protester, trying to prove the treatment isn't safe?

Eight months since losing her mother in the Spanish flu outbreak of 1919, twenty-one-year-old Lillian Carter's life has completely fallen apart. But with her mother gone, a grieving Lillian is rudderless and desperate—the work has dried up and a looming scandal has left her entirely without a safe haven. So when she stumbles upon an employment opportunity at the Frick mansion—a building that, ironically, bears her own visage—Lillian jumps at the chance. But the longer she works as a private secretary for Helen Frick, the daughter of industrialist and art patron Henry Clay Frick, the more deeply her life gets intertwined with that of the family, pulling her into a tangled web where the stakes just may be life or death.


CLARK AND DIVISION by Naomi Hirahara

Chicago, 1944: Twenty-year-old Aki Ito and her parents have just been released from Manzanar, where they have been detained by the US government since the aftermath of Pearl Harbor. The Itos are being resettled two thousand miles away in Chicago, where Aki's older sister, Rose, was sent months earlier and moved to the new Japanese American neighborhood near Clark and Division streets. But on the eve of the Ito family's reunion, Rose is killed by a subway train. Aki is stunned. Officials are ruling Rose's death a suicide. Aki cannot believe her optimistic sister would end her life. Her instinct tells her there is much more to the story, and she knows she is the only person who could ever learn the truth.

Debut Novel. 1920s Mississippi: Ada promised herself she would never go back to the Trace, to her hard life on the swamp and her harsh father. But now, after running away to Baton Rouge and briefly knowing a different kind of life, she finds herself with nowhere to go but back home. And she knows there will be a price to pay with her father. Matilda, daughter of a sharecropper, is from the other side of the Trace. Doing what she can to protect her family from the whims and demands of some particularly callous locals is an ongoing struggle. She forms a plan to go north. As the two girls are drawn deeper into a dangerous world of bootleggers and moral corruption, they must come to terms with the complexities of their tenuous bond and a hidden past that links them in ways that could cost them their lives.


